



## BARON HILL GOLF CLUB

*from the Official Handbook – date unknown?*

Chantry House, Beaumaris, Anglesey

The course was constructed about 1880 for the late Sir Richard Henry Williams – Bulkeley, Bart, grandfather of the president of the club, who bears the same name, and reconstructed in 1946 by R. Walker, the late professional.

The course is delightfully situated in the most beautiful part of North Wales with magnificent views of Anglesey, the Menai Straits and the Snowdonian Mountains.

It is a very pleasant course to play on with natural hazards and springy turf on which the ball sits up in a manner to delight all golfers.

The Club House, a wooden structure was kindly presented to the Club by the Trustees of the Benllech Club in 1950. The Club is fully licensed and members and visitors may partake of liquid refreshments. Teas are served in the summer season.

**1st Hole** **310 yards** **Bogey 4**

The first tee stands on high ground from which a grand view is obtained of the Menai Straits. Snowdonian Mountains, beautiful Beaumaris and district.

A wall runs across the fairway some 180 yards from the tee, which the average golfer can carry unless the wind is against him.

**2nd Hole** **412 yards** **Bogey 4**

A downhill drive. The second shot is usually a teaser as the player has to decide whether or not to try to carry a brook running across the fairway about 50 yards from the green.

**3rd Hole** **436 yards** **Bogey 5**

Uphill drive over a brook. Gorse on either side traps a pull or a slice and there is a wall to carry on the second shot. The green is banked up and not easy to stay on.

**4th Hole** **326 yards** **Bogey 4**

Downhill drive. The second shot has to be well placed to find the green with a narrow fairway and gorse bushes to trap the wayward shots.

**5th Hole** **145 yards** **Bogey 3**

A tricky short hole, with gorse bushes to carry and on either side of the green.

**6th Hole**                                        **230 yards**                                        **Bogey 4**

A narrow neck between trees and a gorse hill in front of the green provides a good test of accuracy for the approach shot.

**7th Hole**                                        **255 yards**                                        **Bogey 4**

A good carry is required from the tee to find a favourable spot to play a second shot on to a plateau green. A roadway runs parallel to part of the fairway.

**8th Hole**                                        **156 yards**                                        **Bogey 3**

Another short hole which has to be played over a tree some 30 yards from the tee.

**9th Hole**                                        **270 yards**                                        **Bogey 4**

Situated alongside a road, which penalises the sliced ball. The green is protected by two mounds of gorse bushes on either side.
